The first letter inquires about the collation of the book and requests a photostat of the title page if the National Library of Scotland were to possess a copy. The typed reply, dated three days later, comes from Alex Rodger, then Assistant Keeper, to say that the library "surprisingly" doesn't have a copy of the work and that his "search of the catalogues of Edinburgh University Library and what remains of the Signet Library has also proved fruitless", nor did the library have either of the other two works edited by Drummond mentioned in the previous letter. Rodger then asks his correspondent for details of a copy that the Bodleian may or may not have held so that he might request a photostat or microfilm for their records.

The book remains scarce to this day, with only five copies now listed on ESTC - two in the UK (the British Library and now the National Library of Scotland) plus three copies in the US (Folger, Rice and Texas).

William Henry Ireland (1775-1835) was a writer and book collector, though his fame, or rather infamy rests on his work as a forger, principally that of documents falsely attributed to the hand of William Shakespeare. Starting in 1794 with a deed bearing Shakespeare's signature, and then, more fancifully, letters to correspondents such as Anne Hathaway, the Earl of Southampton and even Queen Elizabeth I. As the lie grew, Ireland even went as far as to produce a "lost" play, "Vortigen and Rowena", which was performed on Drury Lane. His father, the writer and engraver Samuel, had championed his son's finds and even published a book about them in 1796. However, despite having some prominent supporters, the truth was revealed and, in order to preserve his father's reputation, William published a printed confession. Although William continued to publish books in the succeeding years, his public standing never recovered and he spent the rest of his life in impoverished obscurity.
