

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

The rare and fragile jacket worn to the spine and edges with some neat tissue repairs on the verso, some tanning to the spine, the book itself lovely and bright. Woolmer, 27. **£500**

(vi), 246, (4) pp. Publisher's red cloth, gilt lettered to the spine and decorated to the upper board, dust jacket, 20 pp. Tate St. Ives booklet to accompany an exhibition of 20th century British esoteric and mystical art of the same name. Illustrations by the author throughout. An excellent copy. $\pounds 80$

A cult novel, being a barely fictionalised description of the petty rivalries and squabbles within the artists' community in St. Ives. The book provoked much consternation locally and prompted a libel action leading to the book's early withdrawal from sale. First published in 1962, this is the sole reprint and benefits from the author's glossary of terms and real names bitherto unpublished. Neither edition is common.



A magnificent facsimile of the Kelmscott Chaucer. Usually found in a William Morris designed cloth binding housed in a slipcase with an accompanying volume providing an illustrated description of the work and its illustrations, this copy is evidently out of series, hence the plain binding and the absence of the second volume.

First edition. Three volumes. 19th century blue cloth, spines with double gilt ruled compartments with gilt lettering to three of the panels, title page of volume II supplied from another copy, small old private owner's shelf labels to the front pastedowns. [bound with] The Second and Third Parts of the Works of... London: Printed by J.M. [John Macock] for H. Herringman [and] Printed for Charles Harper, 1688, 89.

Two works bound in one, folio, (1), 41, (1), 80, (4), 58, 61-70, 154, 23, (1), 148; (xiv), 161, (1), (xx), 166, (2, 8) pp, complete despite some erratic pagination, and with the 8 page table to the first work bound at the end of the volume. Two frontispieces, with some old ink stars to the margins at the beginning and near the end of the first work, subtle restoration to the corners of the first few leaves. Modern brown morocco, mild sunning of spine, an attractive copy. $\pounds 350$

Immensely popular in his lifetime, and a lasting influence on Dryden, Cowley's reputation faded in the subsequent centuries. A Royalist who was expelled from Oxford for writing satires against the Puritans, he spent some of the Civil War in Paris attached to Queen Henrietta's court and was employed in deciphering messages between her and King Charles. Wing C6658, C6661. The first work was first published in 1668, the second being the first combined printing of parts 2 and 3 - the sixth edition of part 2 and first edition of part 3. The final part of "Of Plants" was translated by Aphra Behn.

Loosely inserted are two later typed letters signed from Francis Meynell, dated 1946, concerning the book's design, on press stationery. Original orange stained vellum, lower cover slightly bowed, spine sunned. **£900**

The first letter touches on the typography and binding design, with Meynell recounting what Edward Johnson had said to him about cursive capital letters and detailing how the gilt decoration to the covers was adapted from an Arabesque designed by the 16th century French engraver Bernard Salomon. The second letter replies to what must have been a follow-up question about early printing. See insert page one.

scrolled leaf design to both boards, armorial bookplate of an Augustus Samuel Perkins to the front pastedown, a British lilac one penny stamp fixed to the front flyleaf, with above this a later pencilled note indicating this copy was bought at the "Dickens sale July 2 1912", all edges gilt. Frontispiece, title vignette (on which the sign title reads "Tony Veller") and 41 plates including the two Buss plates. Extra illustrated with 32 plates from a pirated edition of the work which contained "illegitimate" illustrations and are signed either "Saml. Weller del." or "J.V. del." and bear the imprint of E. Grattan. Sometime rebacked preserving the original spine, the joints renewed with a well matched leather, the lower corner of the front free endpaper torn and neatly restored, some foxing to the plates as is to be expected although only really pronounced on the frontispiece and engraved title, an appealing copy overall. **£825**

Smith, I, 3, a very early issue with all but two of the errors the bibliographer highlights. See inside front cover.

A Chapman and Hall edition, probably stereotyped, of a work first published in 1857 by Bradbury and Evans. The binding of this edition closely matching the original edition with the addition of the new publishers' names at the foot of the spine.

"Globe Edition". 8vo. (iii)-lxxvii, (i), 662 pp., bound without the half title. Contemporary prize binding from what appears to be Liverpool College ("Earl of Derby's Prize"), full tan calf, award and college crest of a Liver bird in gilt to the upper board, endpapers and all edges marbled. An attractive copy. **£80**

28. ELIOT, T.S. [Four Quartets]. Burnt Norton. East Coker. The Dry Salvages. Little Gidding. London: Faber and Faber (1941-42).

Four volumes, "East Coker" third impression, the others first impression, 8vo, 16 pp each. Corner torn from the fly leaf in "Burnt Norton". Original printed wrappers with some browning to spines and edges, several staples slightly rusty, foot of spines with light wear, but overall a very good sound set. £300

29. ELIOT, T.S. Four Quartets. London: Faber and Faber, 1945.

Third impression thus. 8vo. 44 pp. A skilled amateur binding of brown full morocco, gilt lettered direct to the spine, four blind tooled geometric panels to the upper board. An attractive copy. $\pounds175$

Originally published as separate pamphlets before being collected into one volume, the first Faber edition of which was published the year before. See insert page two.

First edition, first impression, first state, 8vo, 256 pp. Sellotape marks to the endpapers from an old covering for the wrapper, owner's ink stamped name and address to the foot of the fly leaf. Publisher's black cloth, d.w., not price clipped, spine slightly sunned, some minor loss to extremities, lower wrapper browned with a light stain from a cup. **£750** Gilbert A6a (1.1), binding A. The first state was produced without the silhouette to the upper cover. See inside front cover.

A14b (1). Eleven volumes are Book Club or Reprint Society editions, including three using the same jacket artwork as those issued by Cape. The other three works were not reprinted by the Book Club and are near contemporary reprints: "Casino Royale" a mid-60s printing using the green 'Vesper Lynd' artwork designed by Pat Marriott; "Moonraker" an American book club edition and "Octopussy" the second printing of the first US edition (distinct from the NAL book club edition Gilbert goes on to mention).





Loosely inserted is a 12 page typescript of a review of the work by his fellow Blake scholar Robert N. Essick with Commander's pencilled annotations at intervals concerning some of Essick's observations. Also enclosed is an original $6" \times 4"$ colour photograph captioned in pencil on the rear "John [Commander], Bob [Essick], Detto [unknown]" dated "October 21, 1991". Commander spent his life in publishing and for many years headed the Scolar Press. An expert on Blake, he was beavily involved in the refounding of the William Blake Trust and was appointed as secretary and executive director of the organization. He also wrote about Blake and is credited with the design and production of this work on the verso of the title page.

The story of the origins and subsequent disappearance of William Blake's designs for "The Grave" are long and complicated. Blake had been commissioned by Robert Hartley Cromek to produce illustrations for Blair's poem in late 1805 intending for a published edition. Blake assumed he would also be employed to engrave the images and be paid accordingly. However, Cromek had other ideas and gave the work to the Italian engraver Luigi (or Louis) Schiavonetti. Various miscommunications and provocations ensued causing Blake and Cromek to fall out. The published work eventually appeared in 1808 and Cromek passed away four years later at the age of 42. The whereabouts of Blake's designs for the next two decades are broadly known but after their sale in 1836 they completely disappeared. Nineteen of the watercolours in their original red portfolio (reproduced faithfully here) eventually turned up in Glasgow in 2001. Originally offered for sale together as a collection, the ownership passed to a London art dealer who failed to find a buyer. They were subsequently individually lotted up, including the case, and sold at Sotheby's New York in 2006. Now split between "four different countries and two continents", the auction was the last time the collection was held in one place.
