

Beardsley's first major work, at the age of 22, was intended by the publishers to rival the productions of William Morris' Kelmscott Press and took him 18 months to complete. Much of the work shows the influence of Burne-Jones and the Pre-Raphaelites but also takes in elements of Japanese prints and his regard for Whistler.

"...if [Beardsley] had never illustrated another book, this edition of Le Morte d'Arthur could stand as a monument of decorative book illustration... Some of these designs (he never called his drawings illustrations) stand as models of economy, none is impoverished" (Lewis, The 20th Century Book, pp148-9). A facsimile of the small paper issue of the 1893 first edition.

The list of subscribers includes "Miss J. Austen, Steventon". This was certainly the first and quite possibly the only time the author's name appeared in print in her lifetime given that every edition of Austen's novels published before her death were issued anonymously. 13. **BURNS, Robert. 

A surgeon by trade, Gerard also had charge of several important gardens, including that of Lord Burghley and of the newly founded College of Physicians. His Herbal, which was first published in 1597, remains one of the most famous English Natural History books and became a standard work for botanists for centuries. Relying on several other contemporary sources it is not without errors, many of which were corrected by Thomas Johnson, a London apothecary, for the second edition of 1633, of which this is a revised issue.

"Gerard contributed greatly towards the advancement of the knowledge of plants in England... [he] wrote about plants largely for their medicinal qualities, but also drew attention to their decorative value... He paid attention to plants as a source of food... Above all this herbalist knew how to write, and while much has been been written of his faults as a botanist, of the charm of the writings there can be little dispute" (Henrey).

Some worming to the rear free endpaper and pastedown but not affecting any other adjacent leaves, degrees of browning to the contents, occasionally very dark, though a good number of the plates remain fresh, some minor wear to the extremities, else very good. **£5,000** 

Francis Willughby (1635-72) and John Ray (1627-1705) met as students at Trinity College, Cambridge. Whilst Ray's interests primarily led him to the study of botany, Willughby studied the animal world - firstly in Britain, then Europe between the years 1663-65 with fellow naturalist Philip Skippon. Ray published his account of their European travels and researches in his 1673 work "Observations Topographical, Moral, & Physiological; Made in a Journey Through Part of the Low-Countries, Germany, Italy, and France...".

Considered "the foundation of scientific ornithology", Willughby is commonly attributed as the sole author, Ray downplaying his contribution to that of a mere compiler. However, he should be more correctly considered the joint author, dying before he could collate and edit his extensive notes into a coherent whole. Thereafter Ray took on the task, largely rewriting and augmenting the rudiments of his friend's work. The cost of the engravings were born by Willughby's widow, Emma, and, for this reason, this issue is often referred to as the "Widow's Edition". Though Ray privately expressed some dissatisfaction with the illustrations, partly due to failings in the engravers' work but also a result of defects in his own instructions to them, he also expressed pride, writing in the subsequent English edition of 1678: "...the Figures... are the best and truest, that is, most like the live Birds, of any bitherto engraven in Brass."







Engraved by two Wakefield printers, Franks and Johnson, it is an interesting snapshot of industrial Britain at this time, featuring the mineral and natural deposits across the country and, most pertinently, the means by which they could be distributed.

The postcard features a photographic illustration of the Skirrid Mountain Inn, Llanvihansel and is postmarked Abergevenny 16th September 1939. Gill, who dated the card two days earlier, mentions that he is "on the road to Capel-y-ffin having a drink in this pub". He then goes on to express remorse for not seeing Harris to say goodbye but hopes "to return before very long to do 3 key stones". He closes by stating "Birmingham' seems to be maintaining itself." Gill's correspondent was Henry Albert Harris, then Chair of Anatomy at Cambridge University and a Professorial Fellow of St. John's College. It has not been possible to establish the connection between the two but, given the informal tone in which the card has been written, there was clearly a degree of warmth and familiarity to the relationship.

This work, by the French Catholic philosopher Jacques Maritain, was first published in France in 1920. Gill was purportedly introduced to it by his mentor Father Vincent McNabb and was so taken with it that he produced the first English edition for the St. Dominic's Press in 1923. Translated by Father John O'Connor, it was published under the title "The Philosophy of Art". Fiona MacCarthy refers to Gill's involvement in that edition and the profound effect it had on the wider artistic Ditchling community -"When St. Dominic's Press was printing [it] the brethren tended to congregate around the chapel soon after the nine o'clock sung office and would then discuss the finer points of Maritain all morning." The influence of the work on Gill lasted too. Years later, after Gill had moved to Capel-y-fin and started another artists colony, René Hague would refer to "endless talking, in particular about Maritain and the philosophy of art". He trained at Guy's Hospital and another teaching school close by and went on to practise in this general area of London for much of his long career, including serving as the chief medical officer for the parish of St. George the Martyr, Southwark. As a lay brother he was famed for his care of the sick and the poor with miracles being attributed to him through his life and after his death in 1639. He was beatified by the Catholic church in 1837 and canonized in 1962. An apparently uncommon edition of this work: the earliest listed on OCLC is dated 1734, but one copy of this earlier edition has been traced to the Pontificia Università Lateranense in Rome with the same pagination as here.

The city's name has since gone on to be associated with the neurological disorder caused by the pollution. W. Eugene Smith (1918-78) became interested in photography in his teenage years and soon settled on photojournalism as a career. During the Second World War he became a war photographer, taking images of US fighting in the Pacific Theatre. After the war he worked for Life magazine amongst other projects. He was invited back to Japan to document the devastation at Minimata in 1970 and spent the succeeding years investigating the scandal, the work eventually being published back in the US by Holt, Rinehart and Winston and in Britain by Chatto & Windus.
